# Finding Lost Water at the Inaugural Shelly STEM Challenge

Water, water, everywhere at the inaugural Shelly STEM Challenge!

On Saturday, December 3, RVGS held its first Shelly STEM Challenge, and it was a barn burner from start to finish! Our Lab Rats ran the spectrum from freezing up to reaching their boiling points, from feeling buoyant to feeling sunk, from overflowing with exuberance to watching a full day's work go down the drain. It was an entire month of Intersession, including Project Forum, crammed into 5 hours, and our students thrived under the pressure.

In total, 8 teams of 4 competed in the event. All 4 grade levels were represented, as were 4 of our 7 school districts, and 9 of our 13 home schools. The gender split was close to 50/50, with two teams being coed. Sisters competed against each other on separate teams – apparently blood is not *always* thicker than water – and many teams were formed with students from different school districts.

One team worked best to Les Mis, one to Britney Spears, and at least one in complete silence. An allmale team rolled out of bed just in time for the 10 AM start, a coed team got up early enough to dress in matching T-shirts, and an allfemale team planned far enough ahead to arrive decked out in Ninja costumes. In other words, our participants were a mix of typical

Western Virginia Water Authority served as the school's industry partner for the event, and they presented students with a current, real-world problem that they are desperately trying to solve – the loss of 24.5% of their water through leakage in their underground pipe system. They challenged students to come up with solutions using only math, science and technology, and students were required to engineer their solutions using only equipment and materials provided at the challenge. Construction materials were purchased with funds donated to the school in memory of Dr. Richard Shelly, the Governor School's founding director.

To complete the challenge successfully, students had to determine the location of holes in pipes without being able to see the pipes, which proved to be incredibly difficult, messy, and full of trial and error. It was an excellent first challenge that gave our students an opportunity to better understand the issues facing not just our community, but every community.

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# Message from the Director

What an exciting and actionpacked time of the year we are in! The Govie Gala, the Shelly Challenge, preparing for exams, early decision responses coming back from colleges, students receiving awards, holidays, and, of course, the frantic ordering of supplies to be ready for intersession research projects...RVGS is bustling with action!

As we approach the end of the semester, many students can have difficulties with stress. Conversely, some students can feel the pull of being close to winter break and be tempted to coast. My advice for students would be to take a middle road. Exams are impactful and should be taken seriously, but panic and stress about exam preparations are likely to be counter-productive. I urge students to pace themselves in exam prep, studying a reasonable amount of time each night, rather than cramming at the end.

#### **Punkin' Chunkin' in AP Physics**

On October 26th and 27th, AP Physics held their annual Pumpkin Launching contest. Students worked in teams for approximately two weeks outside of school developing trebuchets that could launch small

pumpkins the maximum distances. This year, the designs of the trebuchets varied considerably, from our first ever metal trebuchet to our standard wooden trebuchet. Besides just launching the pumpkins, students had to videotape their launch and then analyze their video using special software that would help them determine initial velocities and launch angles. From this data, students were given the task of trying to determine the average drag force that the pumpkin encountered. Overall, both days were quite successful. The weather was gorgeous and several groups had some very successful launches. AM1's top team was Ryan James, Trevor Buzzard, and Ben Phillips with a launch of 205 feet. AM2's top team was Olivia Menezes, Drew Freeland and Edward Rodriguez (pictured here) with a launch of 227 feet. The launch of 227 feet is RVGS's new official record and will be tough to beat for upcoming AP Physics classes.


