This school year was unlike any other. With schools closing in March, RVGS moved to an online format. The teachers and students met the challenge with typical "RVGS Determined" attitudes! Classes were moved to a format similar to Zoom with classes meeting during normal times. The RVGS teachers did an amazing job of quickly learning to teach and support the students in the new online format. Students did not let the change in setting distract them. Though pajamas became the new dress code, the students managed to maintain their normal dedication to their studies while continuing a nearly 99% at-

tendance rate. RVGS was one of the only schools in Virginia to maintain normal "class" time while offering new curriculum materials for the students.
