#### **AP Environmental Science Paddles** the James River

Mr. Villers recently led a group of AP Environmental Science students on a canoe trip on the upper James River. The trip was part of the educational programs offered by the Chesapeake Bay Foundation. The foundation promotes explorations of local waterways. The program is supported and created in collaboration with the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Association and the National Geographic Society. Their main mission is to reduce pollution in the Bay watershed including the James River. Students paddled a section of the upper James from Buchanan to Arcadia. The students were then able to perform various activities related to water quality from observations of land use around the river to macroinvertebrate assessments and perform testing of other measures of water quality. Prior to the trip, Mr. Villers and students have evaluated water quality indicators at Murray Run and Fishburn Park. for an assessment of Roanoke's local waterways.
